Friends Hold First Event in 18 Months and Raise \$12,000 for Thomas Balch Library Lectures, Seminars, and Virtual Programs

Thank You, Thomas Balch Library Staff!

The Friends of Thomas Balch Library give heartfelt thanks to Library Director Alexandra S. Gressitt, Curator of Manuscripts and Archives Laura Christiansen, and Genealogy Associate Norah Schneider for their remarkable dedication and creativity these past 18 months.

Faced with extraordinary challenges, they found ways to keep the Library open virtually with remote outreach. Somehow they also responded to more than 61,000 reference questions.

As Gressitt wrote in the *Balch Column*, "As we were forced to close our physical doors, we opened our virtual gates...for which we have been hugely rewarded with overwhelming responses from across the United States."

Perhaps when you visited Thomas Balch Library two or three years ago, you might have been just a little curious about all the construction work underway at the Cornwall Street home behind the Library.

On September 19, Friends of Thomas Balch Library at last got to see for themselves when Julie and Steve Chapin opened their backyard for the Friends' annual event—the first since fall 2019.

During the event—"A Teaser for the 2022 Library Anniversary"— Julie Chapin also related the unusual history of the residence going back to 1722 when it was built for prominent Leesburg resident Thomas Birkby.

Nearly 200 years later and two years before the Thomas Balch Library was built—the house became a popular inn and tea room called the Black Cat Inn. Shortly after the Black Cat closed, Alice Tyler Mills acquired the house only to see it go up in flames with the remaining structure torn down by the Leesburg Volunteer Fire Department. In 1950, Mills replaced that home with the present residence. From the Chapins' home, guests walked to the Library for a tour by Library Director Alexandra S. Gressitt, followed by a presentation. Thomas Balch Library Hours

With more individuals vaccinated and indoor masking requirements set, Thomas Balch Library's schedules are firming up.

Wednesday - 2 to 8 PM

Saturday - 11 AM to 4 PM

Sunday - 1 to 5 PM

Note:: The Library will be closed for lunch from 12 to 1 PM Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday.

Although Thomas Balch Library staff members are unable to do extensive research for patrons, they are happy to provide 15 minutes of free general research for patrons who are unable to visit in person.

How Library Staff Can Help You

You can expedite your research request and make it easier for staff to fulfill if you first visit the Library's primary website at https://www.leesburgva.gov/departments/thomas-balch-library. There you will find forms to fill out and send to the Library with details on your research needs.

Be prepared! Thomas Balch Library staff may contact you with a request to narrow the scope of your questions. Staff may ask you to take advantage of remote reference services instead of visiting the Library. Please work with them to help make the most of the investment of their time and yours.

Please be patient and polite with Library staff before, during, and after your visit. Staffing is limited, and response times may be longer than usual. Everyone will do their best to help you; neverthelesss, some services are limited or may not be available.

Panel at Friends Annual Event Shares Library's History

The Friends Annual Event included a panel discussion with Thomas Balch Library Advisory Commission chairman Jim Hershman, James Roberts, and Wynne Saffer, opposite, left to right. Ron Rust served as the moderator. Hershman talked about Thomas Balch, the Library's namesake, and the 1922 construction of the Library. Rust, who was instrumental in developing an endowment for the Library, described how the Library originally was funded by paid subscription.



James P. Roberts, an African American historian who grew up in Leesburg, recalled how he and his friends would play on the Library's front lawn but not be allowed to go inside and check out a book. Only with the construction of Douglass High School, a segregated school, did Blacks in Leesburg have access to a library.

Wynne Saffer presented a brief history of the creation of the Loudoun County library system in the early 1970s and how the town of Leesburg acquired the Thomas Balch Library from the County.

The event contributed \$12,000 to the endowment, which helps to fund Library programs. The Friends give heartfelt thanks to hosts Julie and Steve Chapin, and to sponsors Jeff and Laura Bolyard, W. Thursday, 2 December 2021, 10AM Researching Using Deeds

Wynne Saffer, author of *Loudoun County, Virginia 1860 Land Tax Map*, will use a case study to demonstrate how to establish chain of title using deed indexes and other types of land ownership changes such as wills, marriages, old advertisements, and chancery cases.

Wednesday, 15 December 2021, 1PM A Quiet Cadence—Mark Treanor

Mark Treanor's first novel, A Quiet Cadence, the story of a young Marine in combat and dealing with its aftermath, was published by the Naval Institute Press in 2020. The book won the William E. Colby Award as the best solo work of fiction or nonfiction of 2020 for making a major contribution to military history, intelligence operations or international affairs, as well as the American Library Association's W. Y. Boyd award for the best military fiction published in 2020.

Thursday, 3 February 2022, 10AM African American Genealogy

Steve Hammond and Lori Kimball will use case studies and examples from their research. Kimball, a member of the Black History Committee of Friends of Thomas Balch Library, co-researcher of the Enslaved Community of President James Monroe, and researcher of the enslaved community at Oatlands, will discuss use of online resources, resources available at Thomas Balch Library, Loudoun County Courthouse, and repositories throughout the country. Hammond, a 7th generation member of the Syphax family of Washington, DC, will share his efforts to make the field of genealogy more relevant and interesting to a wider Black audience.

- Martha Mason Semmes joined Cook-Taylor, Kimball, and Bohanon to represent the BHC at the Middleburg Sporting Library concert on August 27.
- Members Larry and Jackie Branch and Donna Bohanon represented the BHC at the 2021 Sterlingfest on October 9.
- BHC cosponsored the NOVA Parks Aldie Mill and Loudoun County Public Libraries program featuring Dr. Deborah Lee, founding member of the BHC. Dr. Lee's program discussed the Loudoun freedom seeker Daniel Dangerfield.
